The program is co-provided by the Columbia University Stroud Center's Statewide Geriatric Psychiatry Residency / Fellowship Program and The Columbia-New York Geriatric Education Center of the Consortium of NY Geriatric Education Center (CNYGEC), in conjunction with Upstate Medical University, Binghamton Clinical Campus CARES Project and the Masonic Care Community. - Differentiate aging myths from aging realities and identify basic demographic data on aging
- Identify three aspects of psychological development across the lifespan
- Differentiate the effect of normal vs. abnormal aging on functional competence
- Discuss the physical changes of aging and their impacts on older persons' quality of life
- Discuss quality of life issues related to end-of-life and palliative care
- Identify three main approaches to maintaining patient quality of life in palliative care services.

- Review and explain the impacts of co-morbid conditions on quality of life in older persons
- Identify the types and prevalence of medical co-morbidity associated with mental health problems
- Explain the predisposing or precipitating risk factors for dementia & delirium in elderly patients
- Identify medications used to manage dementia patients with disturbing behaviors based on symptoms
- Identify treatments used to treat geriatric depression & recent developments made regarding these
- Recognize the types of psychopathology that occur in patients with Alzheimer's disease and/or other dementias
- Recognize the signs and symptoms of alcohol and prescription drug misuse in older persons

Day 5: Thursday, October 13, 2011

- Develop interdisciplinary skills related to the enhancement of quality of life in older people
- Identify and understand the skills related to the development, management and maintenance of interdisciplinary teams
- Distinguish between leader and group member roles for effective teamwork
- Acquire skills for developing and establishing team goals and enhance team cohesion
- Apply evidence-based problem-solving (EPS) methods to promote teamwork

Edward Bradley, MD

Dr. Bradley is a Fellow of the American College of Physicians and an American Geriatric Society Fellow as well as a Certified Medical Director. He was a founder of the Institute of Applied Ethics at Utica College and serves as a member of several community ethics committees in central New York.

Catherine Brownell, RN, PhD

Dr. Brownell is the Chair and Assistant Professor of Nursing at Utica College. She earned her Doctor of Science in Nursing from Binghamton University. Dr. Brownell's research focuses on health promotion and quality of life issues for older adults, especially those residing in rural areas.

Neil K. Hall, MD, MBA

Dr. Hall is former Director of Geriatrics and the founding Director (Emeritus) of the CARES Program at Upstate Medical University Clinical Campus in Binghamton. A graduate of Upstate Medical University and the family practice residency at United Health Services Hospitals in Johnson City, NY, he practiced rural primary care medicine for thirteen years before completing a fellowship in geriatrics at Buffalo and Syracuse. Dr. Hall is certified in family practice, geriatrics, and in hospice and palliative medicine. In addition to his current work in palliative medicine, he is an Associate Research Scientist at the Columbia University Stroud Center. Dr. Hall's major interest is to improve care for older persons through educating physicians and other health care providers. He is currently in private consulting practice in Raleigh, NC.

Nella Khenkin, CSW

Ms. Khenkin is a certified social worker in hematology and oncology at Maimonides Medical Center and Brooklyn Hospital Home Care Health Services in Brooklyn, NY. She received her Masters in Social Work from the Wurzweiler School of Social Work at Yeshiva University, New York City and advanced training in Human Services for Émigrés at the Institute for Child Mental Health in New York. Ms. Khenkin specializes

in Cultural Issues and Aging, is fluent in English, Russian, Byelorussian, and Yiddish, and brings to her presentations a great wealth of cultural experience and humor.

John Krout, PhD

Dr. Krout, is Professor of Gerontology and the Director of the Gerontology Institute at Ithaca College. He has written over 60 book chapters and articles and has published in a wide range of academic journals such as: The Gerontologist, Research on Aging, International Journal of Aging and Human Development and Journal of Gerontology, and has made over 125 presentations at national and state conferences. His books include, Residential Choices and Experiences of Older Adults with Elaine Wethington, The Aged in Rural America, Senior Centers in America, Providing Community-Based Services to Rural Elderly, Aging in Rural Settings, with Raymond T. Coward, and his most recent, Service Delivery to Rural Older Adults with Turner Goins.

Lucia McBee, CSW, MPH

Lucia McBee, LCSW, MPH, is a geriatric social worker who has worked with elders and their caregivers for 27 years. For the past 13 years she has integrated mindfulness and other complementary therapies into her practice with homebound frail elders and those residing in nursing homes; elders with cognitive and physical challenges; patients at the end of life; and their formal and informal caregivers. Her work has been published in peer reviewed journals and presented at national and international conferences. Her recently published book, Mindfulness-Based Elder Care, provides a model of integrated mindfulness based on her clinical practice with older persons.

Lisa McMurray, MD, FRCPC

Dr. McMurray is a geriatric psychiatrist practicing at Pierre Janet Hospital in Gatineau, Quebec. In addition to her work in geriatric psychiatry, she has an interest in cognitive-behavioral psychotherapy and anxiety disorders. She completed the Statewide Geriatric Psychiatry Fellowship Program through Columbia

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University and the Stroud Center for the Study of Quality of Life in 2000, and then practiced on a psychogeriatric outreach team in rural Northern Ontario for three years. Her training in general psychiatry was done at McGill University, after she graduated from the University of Toronto Faculty of Medicine. She is a Fellow of the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada, a Diplomat of the American Board of Psychiatry and Neurology, and has subspecialty qualifications in geriatric psychiatry through the American board.

Patricia Miller, EdD, OTR, FAOTA

Dr. Miller is a Special Research Scientist/Scholar in the Programs of Occupational Therapy at the Columbia University Faculty of Medicine. She brings with her a strong background in rehabilitation of older adults and interdisciplinary geriatric health care. Advanced student practitioners from multiple disciplines, including medicine, nursing, public health, occupational therapy, dentistry and social work, participate in her class at Columbia University entitled "Promoting Interdisciplinary Teamwork in Health Care." She was co-principal investigator of an interdisciplinary government-funded training grant for community practitioners in rehabilitation and health promotion.

Mark Nathanson, MD

Dr. Mark Nathanson is an Assistant Clinical Professor in the Columbia University Department of Psychiatry and Attending Psychiatrist at New York and Presbyterian Hospital. He is a faculty member of the Statewide Geriatric Psychiatry Residency/Fellowship Program at the Stroud Center and Department of Psychiatry at Columbia. Dr. Nathanson is also Director, Psychiatric Emergency Services at Elmhurst Hospital and Medical Center. He previously served as Director of Residency Training in Psychiatry and Director of the Geriatric Psychiatry Fellowship Program at St. Vincent's Medical Center in New York City. Dr. Nathanson is well known for his work in community mental health and geriatric psychiatry and psychiatric emergency services and urban disaster.

Florin Olteanu, MD

Dr. Olteanu is the Associate Medical Director of the Masonic Care Community of New York. He is board certified in geriatrics, having completed a geriatric fellowship at the University of Rochester Medical Center. Dr. Olteanu obtained his MD from Carol Davila University of Medicine and Pharmacy in Bucharest, Romania in 1991.

Victoria M. Rizzo, LCSW-R, PhD

Victoria M. Rizzo, LCSW-R, Ph.D., an assistant professor at the Columbia University School of Social Work, is a John A. Hartford Geriatric Social Work Faculty Scholar, whose health services research is focused on aging and chronic illness. Dr. Rizzo is also a licensed clinical social worker, who has extensive practice experience as a healthcare social worker in a physical rehabilitation setting. Her practice specializations include stroke, spinal cord injury, arthritis, and sexuality issues for chronically ill and disabled older individuals. She also directs the Jewish Association for Services for the Aged Research Institute. She has used this experience to develop and implement health services research studies that examine the efficacy and efficiency of social work interventions in aging with quality of life and cost parameters. As well as examining health care services use by aging individuals with chronic illness and disability, Dr. Rizzo is also committed to building community capacity for the provision of evidence based interventions for chronic diseases, such as arthritis, diabetes and hypertension. Dr. Rizzo teaches Foundations of Social Work Practice II and the required health policy course for students in the Health, Mental Health, and Disabilities Field of Practice.

Douglas Sanders, PhD

Dr. Sanders is Clinical Director and currently serves as a Licensed Clinical Psychologist at the Middletown Campus of Rockland Psychiatric Center, where he is the coordinator of the Cognitive Remediation Program and provides clinical services to a diagnostically diverse population. In addition, he is a full-time faculty member at Orange County Community College within the psychology department, and teaches graduate level courses at Marist College. Dr. Sanders has been involved

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in several diverse areas of research and clinical practice, including psychosocial sequelae of MS affliction, cognition deficits associated with schizophrenia and their remediation, as well as basic perception research investigating the Phi Phenomena in mental imagery.

Indra Singh, MD

Dr. Indra Singh is a board-certified psychiatrist with added qualifications in Geriatric Psychiatry. He completed his medical training abroad and his psychiatric residency training at Albany Medical College in New York. He completed his post-residency subspecialty training in geriatric psychiatry at the Columbia University Statewide Geriatric Psychiatry Program and a fellowship in Addiction Psychiatry in New York City. He is director of Geriatric Inpatient Services at hospitals in the Albany area and specializes in alcohol and prescription abuse in older persons.

Mary Siniscaro, MS, OTR/L

Mary Siniscaro, MS, OTR/L is an Assistant Professor of Health Studies and the Chair of Health Studies at Utica College. Ms. Siniscaro also teaches within the post-professional Masters OT program at Utica College. In addition to Ms. Siniscaro's academic responsibilities, Ms. Siniscaro is also a Registered Occupational Therapist with over 20 years of experience in the neurological/orthopedic arena of practice. Ms. Siniscaro is also a Certified Ergonomic Evaluator as per the Back School of Atlanta. Ms. Siniscaro also has extensive experience in the area of Sensory Integration within both the pediatric/geriatric settings; Ms. Siniscaro is also certified to administer the Sensory Integration Praxis Test (SIPT) as per Western Psychological Services. Ms. Siniscaro is also the owner of Sensory Solutions, focusing on in-service training as well as performing individualized evaluations and personalized sensory intervention protocols.

Regina Sokal, RN, BS

Regina Sokal, RN BS is the Director of Nursing Services at the Masonic Care Community in Utica, NY. Ms. Sokal began her career in eldercare when the model for

providing long term care was the hospital ward. Over the last eight years she has worked with residents, staff, management, and families as the focus moved from the medical/illness view towards a social/community/relationship based approach. The journey or transformation is a work in progress. Ms. Sokal and others who work every day putting the ideals and values of the Masonic Brotherhood and the Pioneer Network into action will share their experiences, the impact on the resident's quality of life, and the impact of such an approach on caregivers/resident relationships.

John Toner, EdD; PhD

Dr. Toner is Associate Clinical Professor of Medical Psychology in the Department of Psychiatry and the Stroud Center of the Columbia University Faculty of Medicine and Senior Research Scientist in the Department of Geriatrics Research at New York State Psychiatric Institute. He is also Director of Geriatric Residency and Fellowship Programs and Co-Director of the Geriatric Psychiatry Fellowship Program. Dr. Toner has published two books on long-term care of the frail elderly and over fifty scientific articles and abstracts in the fields of geriatrics/gerontology and quality of life. His studies have focused on the chronically mentally ill elderly patient and the prevalence of depression among individuals with cognitive losses associated with dementia.

His most recent book, *Geriatric Mental Health Disaster and Emergency Preparedness*, has been published by Springer Publishing Company in May 2010.

Stanley F. Wainapel, MD, MPH

Dr. Wainapel is Clinical Director of Rehabilitation Medicine at Montefiore Medical Center and Professor of Clinical Rehabilitation Medicine at Albert Einstein College of Medicine, Bronx, NY. A physiatrist with more than 30 years of clinical experience, he is the author of more than 60 publications in the medical literature on geriatric rehabilitation, vision rehabilitation, alternative medicine, and physical disability among physicians. He has also lectured nationally on these subjects.
